Minor Midget Players of the Year Named at OHL Cup Showcase

even players from across Ontario received Player of the Year recognition from their respective minor hockey associations at the 2016 OHL Cup Showcase Tournament Banquet.

Players representing the four Ontario Hockey Federation Member Partners including the ALLIANCE, Greater Toronto Hockey League, Northern Ontario Hockey Association, and both the Ontario Minor Hockey Association's ETA and SCTA regions, along with Hockey Eastern Ontario, and Hockey Northwestern Ontario were recognized.

Five of the seven award winners competed at the 2016 OHL Cup, including Owen Lalonde of the Windsor Jr. Spitfires named ALLIANCE Player of the Year, Ryan Merkley of the Toronto Jr. Canadiens named GTHL Player of the Year, Quintin Loon-Stewardson of the Thunder Bay Kings named HNO Player of the Year, Damien Giroux of the Sudbury Minor Midget Wolves named NOHA Player of the Year, and Adam McMaster of the Niagara North Stars named OMHA SCTA Player of the Year. Additional award recipients include Paul Larabie of the Nepean Raiders named HEO Player of the Year, and Aidan Dudas of the North Central Predators named OMHA ETA Player of the Year.

"The Ontario Hockey League is proud to recognize the achievements of these great players," said Adam Dennis, the OHL's Director of Recruitment, who presented the awards at Thursday night's OHL Cup Banquet. "Congratulations to all seven award winners and to their families, coaches, and teammates for a tremendous hockey season, and best of luck to all players as they prepare for the next step in their hockey and academic careers." Minor Midget Players of the Year Named at OHL Cup Showcase

Lalonde and Merkley represent the lone defencemen to claim Player of the year Awards producing more than a point-pergame from the blueline this season leading their clubs in scoring. Lalonde tallied 37 points including 13 goals in 33 games, with Merkley collecting 44 points including seven goals in 33 games. Merkley represented Canada and earned a silver medal at the Youth Olympic Games playing alongside Dudas who scored 51 points including 25 goals in 31 games for the Predators. Other stat lines among the forwards include McMaster who led his club with 53 points including 27 goals in 36 games, Giroux with 36 points and 15 goals in 23 games, Larabie picked up 34 points in 45 games with 15 goals for his Midget AAA club, while Loon-Stewardson led the Kings with 62 points including 32 goals in 55 games.

The awards were presented at the OHL Cup Showcase Tournament Banquet for the sixth straight year recognizing the achievements of the top minor midget aged players from across Ontario. The awards are presented annually to honour the minor midget players who best exemplify outstanding ability and the qualities of sportsmanship and leadership as voted by the minor hockey coaches, managers and organizations of each respective league.

York Simcoe Express win 2016 OHL Cup

he 2016 OHL Cup Showcase Tournament was destined to end in either a three-peat or a trifecta.

Rhys Forhan's goal 7:17 into the second overtime completed the triple crown for the York Simcoe Express, as they added an OHL Cup title to their Silver Stick and OMHA Championships.

Forhan's second of the night came on a turn-around wrister that snuck under the pad of Toronto Marlboros goaltender Elliott Tang, giving the Express a 2-1 victory for their first OHL Cup title since 2004.

"It feels amazing, there's no place I'd rather be," said the night's hero. "Doing it for the boys is amazing and being able to capitalize in front of everyone, there's no feeling like it."

Forhan's winner capped off a furious overtime pace that saw the two clubs swap chances, forcing Tang and OHL Cup MVP Andrei Berezinskiy in goal for York Simcoe into some tough saves.

The Marlboros opened the scoring at 4:31 after Tang turned aside a two-on-one attempt by Cameron Hillis and Richard Whittaker. Blueliner Pierre-Luc Forget took a neutral zone feed from Thomas Tinmouth, crossing the top of the circles before beating Berezinskiy over the shoulder on a shot that trickled over the goal line.

After a scoreless second period, an Express powerplay 7:39 into the third didn't yield any results on the scoreboard, but it did provide them sustained pressure as they wore Toronto down, scoring a shift into even strength play.

A failed Marlboros clearing attempt saw Ian Vucko hold the play at the offensive blueline as he quickly dished to Robbie Cranston who found a waiting Forhan in the slot. Forhan waited out Tang, tucking the puck past his outstretched pad for his first of the showcase at 10:53 to tie the score at one.

The second straight Championship game to require overtime also marked the first double overtime Championship game in OHL Cup history coming to an end 7:17 into the period when Forhan turned and fired a shot under the pad of Tang to vault the Express onto the ice in celebration. Continued Page 9

Six players were named to the Gatorade OHL Cup All-Star Team at the conclusion of the Championship game. Those players include Marlies forwards Akil Thomas (7 GP, 6-7—13) and Danil Antropov (7 GP, 7-3—10), Niagara North Stars forward Hunter Holmes (4 GP, 6-3--9), blueliner Justin MacPherson (7 GP, 0-3--3) of the York Simcoe Express and defenceman Declan Chisholm (6 GP, 2-3--5) of the Don Mills Flyers. York Simcoe's Berezinskiy rounded out the selections in goal with a 5-0 record to go with a 2.09 goals-against average.

Hockey Night in Canada star and Minor Hockey advocate Don Cherry presented the OHL Cup alongside OHL Commissioner David Branch and GTHL First Vice President Ken Smith. Monday's Final was played before an energetic crowd at Mattamy Athletic Centre and was also broadcast across the country live on Sportsnet Ontario.

The OHL Cup Showcase Tournament provides fans and scouts one last opportunity to see many of the top minor midget aged players from across Ontario and parts of the United States compete for the OHL Cup performing against the best competition prior to the 2016 OHL Priority Selection.

A proud Ontario Hockey Association (OHA) alumnus, the current American Hockey League (AHL) Toronto Marlies forward has carved a regular role in his first year of hockey at the professional level. Growing up playing four different sports, Hyman also picked up the writing bug. It's become a skill so sharp, he's likely more qualified to write this story than the author is.

"In grade seven, I wrote a book and I won a short story competition," said Hyman.

The short story was the premise behind Hyman's second book titled 'Hockey Hero'. It's about a boy who overcomes playing in the shadow of his more successful older brother and makes it to the National Hockey League (NHL).

Hyman began doing speaking engagements and turned that competition victory into a two-book deal with Random House. His first book titled 'The Bambino and Me' tells the story of a young Yankees fans who grew up idolizing hall of famer Babe Ruth.

Hyman sticks to writing children's books but could one day write an excellent autobiography of his hockey career.

The former Hamilton Red Wing is well decorated in the OHA ranks. He led his former team in scoring in his final year and also served as captain.

With his father Stuart well established in the hockey world, Hyman was expose to hockey at an early age. "My parents put me into hockey pretty early," said Hyman. "I was skating at age four or five. I started playing hockey right after that."

His brother, Spencer, also played the game before settling in as an Assistant General Manager and coach of the Markham Royals.

After a solid second year with the Red Wings, Hyman was selected 123rd overall by the Florida Panthers at the 2010 NHL entry draft. He would return for another year with the Red Wings where he amassed 42 goals and 102 points in 43 games. He was recognized by Hockey Canada as the Canadian Junior Hockey League Player of the Year.

With his academics front and centre, Hyman elected to continue his hockey career at the United States collegiate level. He won various awards that ranged from his commitment to strength and conditioning and his grades in school.

In his final year, Hyman registered 22 goals and 54 points in 37 games. He was a Hobey Baker award finalist, a trophy that recognized the best player in Collegiate hockey.

Because many years had passed since he was drafted, the Panthers were about to lose the rights to Hyman. They subsequently traded him to his hometown team, the Toronto Maple Leafs for forward prospect Greg McKegg.

"Being in the organization to one day play for the Leafs was pretty special," said Hyman "To be here with my friends and family, it's been a dream come true."

Hyman, 23, has a unique distinction of being one of the few Marlies players to ever grow up being a new generation Marlies fan.

The Maple Leafs affiliate relocated from St. John's, Newfoundland, to Toronto in 2005. Hyman was 12 at the time.

"I was a Mats Sundin fan growing up, but I remember when the Marlies moved here I went to a lot of Marlies games," Hyman recalled. "To end up playing for the team you grew up watching is quite surreal."

Hyman has jumped all around the Marlies lineup. As has been the case with AHL teams, players are developed to play at various different positions in order to better each player's development.

"He's been really good for us," said Marlies head coach Sheldon Keefe. "He's a real hard worker and he's one a bunch of guys who come in here with a positive attitude every single day. He's impressed me so far."

Hyman has recorded six goals 13 points as the Marlies hit the midway point of the season. He, like many of the Marlies are new to a team that is emulating a style of play similar to the Maple Leafs lead by coach Mike Babcock.

Through their first 30 games, the Marlies are a league best 23-5-2 with a winning percentage of .800. A winning culture has been creat-

"I think it's great that there are so many new faces and that all of the guys are gelling well," said Hyman. "Sheldon has done a pretty good job of bringing everyone together in such a short amount of time. There's a lot of continuity of what we're doing here and what the Leafs are doing so it's been a pretty easy transition for guys growing up."

At 23 years of age, his hockey career is only beginning. The story is still unfinished. Although he only writes children's books right now, Hyman can write one heck of a memoir.

"I just have to make sure I continue to take mental notes of everything that is happening," Hyman said. "It would be pretty cool to do that one day."
